ALUMNI SPOTLIGHTS: FIRST YEAR GEOLOGY MAJORS

This fall, students who completed the GeoFORCE and STEMFORCE in the summer of 2019 entered their first semester of college. Ten of our new alumni are now on the path to becoming geoscientists.

Four of these alumni are from the Southwest cohort. We are delighted to welcome two of them to The University of Texas at Austin. Abigayle Carnes of Uvalde and Juan Vazquez, valedictorian of C.C. Winn High School in Eagle Pass, join ten other GeoFORCE alumni currently studying at the Jackson School of Geosciences.

The remaining two Southwest alumni who chose geology, Benjamin Chapa and Aracely Saldivar, both come from small cities of fewer than 10,000 people. Chapa was salutatorian of his graduating class at Carrizo Springs High School and now attends Texas A&M University at Kingsville. Meanwhile, Saldivar moved from Hondo High School to The University of Texas at San Antonio.

Vazquez and Chapa are two of six GeoFORCE alumni who received either valedictorian or salutatorian distinction this year. Jazmine Mae Velasquez was the valedictorian for Carrizo Springs High School and chose to major in computer engineering at The University of Texas at San Antonio. In C.C. Winn's sister school of Eagle Pass High, Edwin Pua was valedictorian and Alyssa Barrientos was salutatorian. Pua is now at Stanford and Barrientos is majoring in political science at Boston Collage. Skylar Blalock was salutatorian of La Pryor High School and is studying international relations and global studies at The University of Texas at Austin.

In the anonymous feedback survey given to students at the end of their summer 2019 academies, one student shared how GeoFORCE affected their choice of major. "I love the ambience [of GeoFORCE]. The ability to be around students with the same mindset of college. Holding a bond over the 4 years... I was able to find my passion through GeoFORCE and I now plan on majoring in the geosciences!"

GeoFORCE Texas is an outreach program through The University of Texas at Austin's Jackson School of Geosciences that introduces high school students from underserved communities to STEM and geoscience careers through summer field experiences, corporate mentoring, and college guidance. In 2015, our program was honored with the Presidential Award for Excellence in Science, Mathematics, and Engineering Mentoring—the highest such honor from the United States government. Another four of the students now majoring in geology are alumni of the STEMFORCE program, whose 12th Grade Academy was sponsored by the KLE Foundation. Three hail from Austin ISD's Akins High School where they were enrolled in a UT OnRamps geoscience class taught by GeoFORCE alumnus Enrique Reyes. Jackson Battle is now at Texas A&M University, Isabel Johnson at the University of Iowa, and Leslie Rosario at The University of Texas at San Antonio.

STEMFORCE also had a strong presence at Ann Richards School for Young Women Leaders. Alumni of the 2020 graduating class include valedictorian Anne Katula and Eleanor Jeansonne, who is studying geology at Occidental College in Los Angelos.

Johnson, Rosario, and Jeansonne all participated in the American Geophysical Union's Bright STaRS program in December 2019 and presented their 12th grade STEMFORCE capstone projects. We hope to see them return to AGU in coming years with more geoscience research.

The final two GeoFORCE alumni majoring in geology are from the Houston cohort.

Memphis Edwards graduated from Energy Institute High School and chose to attend Oklahoma State University. Meanwhile, James Sun of Bellaire High School was thrilled to enroll at The University of Texas at Austin's Jackson School of Geosciences.

"I feel very fortunate to have been a part of the GeoFORCE program," Sun said. "GeoFORCE was where I made new friends, created lasting memories, and found my passion in geology. Because of GeoFORCE, I was able to find my future and direction in college.
